Introduction

Although the first seventy five years of the existence of Lodges or Chapters does not attract official recognition, many of them do mark these occasions by special meetings or festivals of varying magnificence, according to their general and financial status.

We of the Cornhill Chapter thought that we might celebrate our seventy fifth year of existence, to this end, this brief history of the Chapter has been compiled.

The minute books of the period, together with a membership register and a small amount of correspondence are still in existence.

In this small, informally produced, booklet we start on a note of authenticity with a reproduction of the menu of the Consecrating Meeting.

A comparison with present day costs is more than interesting when we reflect that this menu cost £1.6s.0d per head for the seven course meal, with cigars, cigarettes, port and wines included! The accounts show the sum of £33.0s 6d as being paid to the Hotel Metropole in full settlement of the bill for this gigantic repast.

The First Seventy Five Years of the Cornhill Chapter No. 1803

At the beginning of the First Minute Book of the Cornhill Chapter No.1803, we find the following 'notes' in the handwriting of W.Bro. Marmaduke Kittoe.

'At a Regular Meeting of the Cornhill Lodge No.1803 held at the Hotel Metropole, Northumberland Avenue, WC2. on February 4th 1929, the desirability of forming a Royal Arch Chapter in connection with the Lodge was discussed, a Committee, as under, was formed to report to the Lodge at its next Regular Meeting'.

At that next Meeting held on 1 April 1929 the above Committee reported favourably and W.Bro. Kittoe gave a written Notice of Motion to that effect.

In accordance with the Book of Constitutions, at a special meeting of the Lodge on 10 August 1929, the following resolution by Bro. R.W. Bruce, seconded by W.Bro. Godfrey R. Vick, PM., was passed:—

'That a Royal Arch Chapter be formed in connection with the Cornhill Lodge No.1803'.

The Founders met on 12th December 1929, the necessary petition was prepared and the fees as under were fixed:—

The Consecration

The Consecration took place at the Hotel Metropole, Northumberland Avenue, WC2. on Monday 19 May 1930, at 5.30pm.

The Consecrating Officer was Ex.Comp. Sir Phillip Colville Smith, Grand Scribe 'E'.

There were nine visitors recorded in the minutes (three of whom held knighthoods).

The ceremonial music was under the direction of Ex. Comp. William Barrand, PPGOrg. and was rendered by the four 'Eton Singers'.

Four members of the Lodge were nominated for Exaltation at a subsequent meeting and the Consecrating Officers all accepted Honorary Membership.

Unfortunately Ex.Comp. S. F. Fitch the MEZ, was to become ill and eventually die in December 1930. Ex.Comp. Harry Dunaway was elected to take his place.

Progression

The Chapter rapidly grew to about twenty members, but then appeared to settle down to sixteen or so, around which figure it remained until the advent of the Second World War in 1939. The leakage of members through death or resignation appearing to be offset by new members, on fairly equal terms.

With the onset of war in 1939, emergency measures were introduced, for instance, subscriptions were reduced to one guinea (£1.1s.0p) per year and the Chapter was permitted to hold its meetings *after the Lodge* (at the Criterion Restaurant) on the second Mondays in February, April and December, as a temporary measure of course!

On these occasions the Brethren and Companions met for lunch at 1.30pm., 'if they so desired'. As with the Lodge, some seven or eight Companions bravely battled to keep the continuity going. Dates of meetings were changed and subsequently 'Under Emergency War Regulations', the Chapter moved to Freemason's Hall (for the second time) in June 1943, when the Companions were 'invited to remain for the Cornhill Lodge Meeting and for the Lodge dinner at the Connaught Rooms at 6pm'.

Fifteen members paid dues that year. It must have been particularly difficult to comply with all these changes in days of both meeting and Installation dates, etc., but the membership remained steady at about sixteen, even if the attendances were small on occasion. These various moves of venue in the war years can be seen in the appropriate Appendix.

In about 1946, with a move to the Talbot Restaurant, the subscription was increased to the original £3.3s.0p per annum and the meetings resumed more normal features, starting for instance at 5.30pm. The summons began to be printed again instead of being produced on office duplicators.

After 1969, however, the Chapter began to decline. The numerical membership kept up reasonably well but the active side suffered, due to Companions moving to other parts of the British Isles and overseas. Illness and the loss of older members by death and retirement eventually brought the active force to a very low ebb indeed. It must be remarked that other London Chapters were also experiencing this unfortunate trend. It was resolved by a determined few, that the Charter must not be relinquished. Past Principals rallied around, going through the Chairs again and again. Sinecures were listed as Officers and jobs were doubled up and subsequent 'recruiting' produced some valuable stalwarts from Cornhill Lodge and the Province of Essex.

In recent years our membership has been maintained at approximately 26 to 28 Companions of which number approximately 50% are regular and active companions of the Chapter. We now draw our main membership from Cornhill Lodge and Bouverie Lodge, both Lodges have been instrumental in providing Companions of very high quality and the Chapter looks forward to a long and enjoyable future.

A little may be said about the professional flavour of the members over the years.

Of the Founders, two were members of the stock exchange, two were barristers and a sprinkling of company secretaries and retired businessmen. Today, though the lawyers have gone, the companions have remained mainly in executive positions but spread over a much wider and more diverse range of professions and trades, which makes for a varied and interesting membership.

Our charity record has been consistent, although reflecting the fact that the number of Companions have been relatively smaller than the Lodge. Records show that the Chapter has, each year, contributed sums to the Masters List of Cornhill Lodge and within limited means, a benevolent fund has been maintained and dispensed.

In conclusion we call your attention to the appendices, which show lists of First Principals, Scribes E, Treasurers and Janitors, together with the various venues over the years.

Leading lights

Several names must be mentioned here, as companions of particular note, those of :-

Ex. Comp. A. S. Roberts, SLGCR, (who occupied the First Principals Office five times, by Dispensation etc., from 1969 to 1975 as well as twice in 1957 and 1959).

His dependability in ritual and attendance, his wise counsel in committee, were indispensable. His record can only be equalled by:—

Ex. Comp. H. T. Addiscott, who occupied the First Principals Office for five years in succession during the war and twice in 1953 and 1954. Then also, that ubiquitous and remarkable man, who was our Janitor for many years:—

Ex. Comp. Eric Richardson, PPGReg. (Kent) who could occupy any office at the drop of a hat (whilst another Compion guarded the outer door, of course). One other Companion must be mentioned, the Companion who with several other stalwarts resolved to keep the Chapter going when the attendance dropped as low as seven or eight Companions, the Companion who held the Chapter together at that time was:—

Ex. Comp. Ernie Lockett, SLGCR, our Scribe E for many years.

A singularly outstanding feature of the Chapter has always been the wonderful atmosphere and friendliness, particularly at our Festive Boards and what is very important, the quality of the ritual has never suffered.

Ode to Cornhill Chapter

The Companions of Cornhill Chapter continue to shine, and have plenty of fun when they sit down to dine.

This Chapter has a fine reputation,

And thank all it's Founders for it's Consecration.

We have Stock Brokers and Directors and Old Soldiers Galore,
